# New Moon Co-operative Cafe

Nestled in the heart of downtown Olympia is a quaint, hole-in-the-wall cafe with some of the best breakfasts in town. New Moon Co-operative Café has been around for two decades, and has been organized as a co-operative for the past six years. The cafe switched to a co-op model when a group of its workers who also ran The Flaming Eggplant (The Evergreen State College's student-run co-op cafe) decided to collectivize New Moon as well. The workers had a vision of a cafe that focused on anti-oppression, decision by consensus, and empowering its workers. It is, to this day, one of the most well known co-ops in Olympia.

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A few blocks down 4th Ave, is Le Voyeur, which came to fame in the 90's with loud punk music and a grungy aesthetic. Over the years, the crew of people working there became as close knit as family. When the owner started speaking of selling the business, the workers knew that, without their unique vision, the business would likely close down. Many locals felt it would be a

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tragedy to lose this symbol of Olympia's signature punk scene. So the employees decided to all pitch in and buy it.

At one point, New Moon Co-operative was considering buying Le Voyeur, as they wanted to expand and grow. The sale needed to happen faster than they were prepared for however, so instead they are helping the workers of Le Voyeur, "Our collective hope as co-ops is to build stronger coalitions that fight against existing oppressive business practices in Olympia."

So what does this all mean? Well, Le Voyeur will still be here, and they are going to focus on creating a safe community space. They will be placing a heavy emphasis on their punk roots, inspired by 115 Legion. The community of workers there will now be empowered to decide how their business is run and how the space is used.
